POOR RELIEF.

REPORT FOR PAST YEAR. The Secretary, Miss A. M. Machar, abmitted the following The Committee of the Kingston Poor Relief Association, in closing the eighteenth year of their work, feel that as the poor we have always with us, they cannot relax their operations so long as there exists no other means of supply ing the necessities of the helpless classes which are their more especial charge. viz., widows with families, aged people unable to work and those who are laid aside by sickness and temporarily prevented from earning their own support. It is on behalf of these needy classes that they yearly appeal to the public. and the relief in wood and bread, which they have been enabled year after year to administer, has been the means of alleviating much of the suffering and extreme destitution that would other wise have prevailed.

During the past year there have been from November to April, besides which cases also receiving assistance, thoughnot regularly. Of these there have been fourteen cases of aged people, upwardof eighty and some of them nearly nine ty years. Four deaths have occurred among those aided by the Society, three of them after a long and severe illness. The families of a number of working men, in distress owing to want of employment towards the close of the winter, were also assisted by the Society.

The expenditure of the Society dur ing the past two years has considerably exceeded their receipts, the need being greater and collections smaller, so that they have been obliged to exhaust a small reserve fund which they had for years to fall back itpon, and must now depend entirely upon the funds placed at their disposal by the liberality of the public. They would therefore earnestly appeal for more liberal collections in view of the need which is certain to exist during the winter, for it is impossible for them, in the long cold winter, to refuse food and fuel where it is absolutely needed to prevent starvation. They, therefore, trust that it will be placed in their power, by liberal contributions, to supply the urgent needs of those to whom no other source of aid is open, and who look to them for the help they have been wont to give.
