CITY FINANCES.—The Finance Committee of the city and county will meet to-morrow evening at 11 o'clock to debate the question of jury and grand expenses.

MARINE NOTES.

The freight from Kingston to Oswego on barley is 2½c per bushel.

The schr. Snowbird, which was ashore at Oswego, is "not much damaged."

The schr. Cotter is a total wreck, but the cargo and vessel were both fully insured.

The schr. White Oak loaded 8,300 bush. of rye and 4,000 bush. of barley for Oswego.

The prop. City of Montreal will load 14,000 bush. of barley from a barge for Oswego at 2½c.

The schr. Jessie Drummond cleared this morning from Bath for Buffalo with barley at 4c per bushel.

The large Adventure left for Montreal with 8,000 bushels rice, shipped by Messrs. Richardson & Son.

Passed through the Welland Canal for Kingston.—Sarah Ryan, vagabond, was committed for six months to gaol.

G. Gaffner, drunkard, paid the usual penalty, a fine of \$2.

The case of William Murray, selling on the Market Square, adjourned from the 5th of October last, was continued, resulting in the defendant being fined \$2 and costs.

PENITENTIARY CASE.—The petition for the commutation of the sentence of Felix Mathe, who is now in the Kingston Penitentiary, was to be presented to His Excellency the Governor General yesterday by Mr. Tasse, M. P. The document is signed by over six hundred citizens of Ottawa.

A SAN PLIE.—Sarah Ryan appeared this morning with a five month old child in her arms. She admitted that she was an outcast, had neither friends nor home. Many times previously she had made a similar statement in court. Six or good months was the best that could be done for her.
