THE PASSION PLAY. The attempt to introduce a theatrical representation called the "Passion Play" which would be a pretentious portrayal of the sufferings and death of the Saviour is very properly encountering considerable opposition in New York City. Large and lax as public licence is in matters of this kind we do not think it will permit the introduction of the "Passion Play." There is enough of what may be termed incidental profanity on the stage as it is, but to carry profanity the length of wholesale blasphemy as this play certainly does is to thoroughly outrage all sense of public decency and propriety and is something that the public opinion of a Christian community will not think of tolerating.
