A Citizen Clubbed on Park Avenue

Highway robbery is of rare occurrence n this city, but infroquency does not

He had only gone a short listance further when he received a heavy blow on the head, which felled him to the ground. The stroke proinced insensibility, but the assailant does not appear to have been cognizant of this fact, since various wounds and bruises indicate additional maltreat ment while the young man lay prostrate and helpless. His face especially has been marked, apparently by the nails of the robber, who must have held his han I across Perry's mouth to prevent an outcry. The victim of this murderous attack was, robbed of some \$42 which he carried in a book in an inner pocket. In the hurry to secure the booty the thief tore the clothing of the roung man considerably. Evidently the latter knew his man, and suspected, f he did not know, that Perry had the wealth aforesaid in his possession. Perry remained in an unconscious condition until picked up by Mr. W. Leslie who having identified him had him removed to the residence of Mr. W. Perry, his brother, where his injuries were atended to by Dr. K.N. Fenwick. Charles Perry says he did not recognize the robber, but he was observed to be rather tall, to have a soft felt hat, and to be muffled.
