ADDRESS TO LADIES.

On Monday afternoon at three o'clock the Rev. Dr. Mackay addressed the Kingston Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in the St. Andrew's Hall. The meeting was the only one addressed by Dr. McKay in Kingstoa, which was not crowded, and it is much to be regretted that many more ladies did not avail themselves of the privilege enjoyed by those who were present.

Dr. McKay began by giving a sketch of the life of a Chinese woman from infancy to old age. Every month of the just year the female infants' heads are shaved, in order to produce a strange growth of hair. At one year old, if the feet are to be very small, the process of compression is began; if the parents are not rich it is deferred till two three, four or five years of age. Dr. McKay exhibited the long narrow bandage used in the process. Other instruments are used, and the feet must al ways remain bandaged or the woman could not walk at all.
