TRUE CHUNCH CREED.

It is to be remembered that the Congregational churches in New England and generally in the United States are agreed as to the adoption of the Westminster and the Savoy confessions of taith. The Congregational churches have unquestionably said that these confessions do not properly represent divintruth. They have substantially declared to-day that their doctrines have to be reconstructed into more harmony with divine truth. Tis one step, and it is good, but it is a step that I have taken in this congregation more than thirty years ago; fea, more, I have heard from

yet that in the expression of these TRUTHS IN THESE CREEDS they expressed themselves in language which did not interpret Scripture or give the idea of Scripture, but rather concealed and overshadowed its real meaning. In the providence of God the thoughts of men have been turned to this, and during the last hundred years they have started to come to the conclusion that these creeds do not express the truth as represented in Congregational churches or in other churches. There is one step farther that I have gone and that is this-that we are not ready yet to formulate a creed. have not lived long enough yet. If you do not understand the philosophy of man how can you understand the philosophy of God? If I say that God. is just and never have a consciousness of justice I say nothing-it is darkness. There are one or two things that should be understood by these creed makers before they begin. Are they going to work with their backs toward the past and their faces toward the future, or with their faces toward the past and their backs toward the future? Are they also go

ing to take into their confidence MEN WHO ARE DEVOUTLY SCIENTIFIC? Are they going to give expression to the views of such men? Are they going to give expression to the views of men whose beliefs are obtained from the manuscript of rocks? Are they going to say that the Bible is inspired, and leave men to slink through the Bible and make out its meaning as best they can? Men read about, Noah's drunkenness; they read David's implicatory psalms; they read narratives of the ter rible worldliness and animalism of man. and they interject with their reading a superstition of the Divine origin of Scripture and they are confused. Is the committee going to meet the exigencies of this reticent thought? Is it to be a ereed that is going to subsidize the enginery of religion for religion itself? or is there to be a creed that will set forth the mner and spiritual life of man? Today a man may come in to the communion table who yesterday was reek ing with eaths and profane expletives, if be has only said his prayers this morning and said he was sorry for it. A man may be very wicked before God, and

Morer-Enting in Berlin. In Berlin the average number of horses killed for food this year has been 450 per month, while last year it was 850. All the horses eaten are killed in the central slaughter house, and each horse before it is killed is carefully examined by two veterinary surgeons. At the present time the butcher pays about forty-two marks, or \$10.50, for a piece of horseflesh weighing from 250 to 300 pounds, but he retails it at forty pfennige (or about ten cents) a pound for the fillet, twenty-five pfennige per pound for other pieces, and twenty pfennige for parts only fit to be made into sausages; and as horseflesh is naturally very dry a good deal of it can only be utilized by being mixed with lard and converted in to sausages, which, it is suspected, largely consumed by people who are little aware of what they are eating. In one or two of the German towns the consumption of horseflesh is, in proportion to their population, much larger than in Berlin .- Parisian.
