THE INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY .- The St. Johns, N.B., Globe, of Dec. 29, says: -Mr. from England, and leaves for Fredericton to-morrow morning. The papers have already announced that the delegates were successful. We are now able to state wherein that success consists, as regards the Intercolonial Railway. The Imperial government have agreed to ask Parliament to authorise the guarantee of a loan of £3,000,000 sterling. for the construction of the road. The Lords Commissioners of the Fund, and to issue their debentures, bearing a rate of interest which will enable them to float these debentures at par. It is supposed that, as the Imperial government negotiates the loan, the money will be obtained at 31 per cent. By this arrangement there will be no charge for commission on the part of the Commissioners negotiating the loan, or receiving or paying the interest thereon-except, as is possible. part of the loan may be obtained through the Bank of England, who charge the government an eighth per cent. Thus a large saving will be made in commissions, and the interest will probably be but £105,000 instead of £129,000. , as origin lly estimated, when it was contemplated that the Colonial government should issue the debentures for the money, under the Imperial guarantee. The portion for which each colony is responsible is as follows :---Canada, £1,250,000; Nova Scotia, £875,000 New Brunswick, £875,000. The interest is to be paid half-yearly into the Imperial Treasury, and the principal as follows :-- onetwelfth in ten years, two-twelfths in twenty years, four-twelfths in thirty years, and fivetwelfths in forty years. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, following the usual precedents in such cases, asks that a Sinking Fund shall be established, sufficient to figuidate the debt at the expiration of the term named, but has consented that no payment to this fund shall be required until 1873, or ten years from the commencement of the loan. The Sinking Fund was objected to by the delegates, prin cipally because it involved the investment this fund in consols bearing but three or three and a quarter per cent interest, and by which a loss would, of course, be sustained. obviate this difficulty, Mr. Gladstone has consented that the fund shall be invested in our own securities, or in such other securities as may be mutually agreed upon between the two parties. 


