Death of an old Resident,

Mr. John Greenizen, who died at his residence in Leeds, three miles West of. Gananoque, on Monday last, was one the oldest settlers in this part of the country. He was born in Canton Berne, Switzerland, on the 5th of December, 1780, and was in his 95th year at the time of his death. His younger days were spent in the midst of wars and turmoils, and at an early age, he enlisted in an army raised to repel an invasion of the French. Afterwards, when France prevailed, he left his native land and spent two years or more in Spain and Germany. but coming back he again enlisted, and a compromise being made between France and Switzerland, he enlisted in the French army-for three years and fought

under Marshal Sault at Corunna and er by the English, and his term with France having expired, he was induced to join the British army, in which he served several years at Malta, Gibraltar and other places, and was finally sent to Canadaduring the war of 1812. He was at the taking of Oswego, and was captured at Fort Erie by the Americans, remaining a prisoner for seven months, when he was exchanged, and the war ceasing soon afterwards, he was discharged at Kingston in 1813. He drew his lot of land from the government, but for some cause his title was not completed, and the lot (near Perth) was sold to another man. A valuable tract was about that time left by will to his son, and on that he settled, and remained during his life. He was a quiet, inoffensive man, upright in his dealings, and respected by all. His infirmities have kept him so close for a. number of years that the present generation have not seen much of him. He leaves a wife and one son, with a large number of grand and great grand children. — Gananoque Reporter.
