



A L.L. SAINTS' was erected about 1864 under the energetic lead of the Rev. Mr. Windsor, chaplain I to the imperial forces. The money required \$2,000, was raised by voluntary contributions. It was intended to be the worshipping place of all churchmen but to represent especially advanced ritual. The clergymen in charge, succeeding Mr. Windsor, were Revs. Messts. Mulvaney, Plees, Beaven, Bousfield, Prime and Rayson. All Saints' is the only church in the city absolutely free. The two last rectors were thoroughly devoted to their duties being literally worn out in the end by the continual round of service. Their selt denial spoke volumes of the depth and sincerity of their religion. The rectorship is vacant; for one embued with missionary spirit the post offers an opportunity for aggressive and sustaining work rarely met with.

CI. LUKE'S was built about twelve years since for the convenience of church goers in Williamsville suburb, and its faithful little congregation is ministered to by Rev. A. W. Cooke in connection with Christ Church, Cataraqui. This latter is a beautiful edifice within the former confines of Cataraqui Cemetery, erected a quarter of a century ago under the impulse of Rev. Dr. Henry Wilson's zeal and piety. He Spened services at the village, the people rallied around him and the Church was built on handsome ecclesiastical lines.
