BANKER FINED.

Ordered to Pay \$4,504.12 or Go to Jail to Work It Out.

Chicago, July 5 - Former banker George L Magill, precident of the defunct Avenue savings bank, was found guilty of receiv ing deposits after insolvency. The amount of the deposit received was \$2,252 21 The court floed Magil! double this sum, or \$4,504 43. It was ordered that the defendant stand committed, and that if the fine and costs were not paid he be sent to the house of correction to work out such fine and costs at the rate of \$1 50 a day. This would keep the defendant in the house of correction about eight years and eix monthe.

The state asked that Magill be sent to the penitentiary. But the court reemed in doubt about the validity of such a sentence under the law and the circumstances.

The opposition is in the greatest earnest-ready to lose and spill blood. Meanwhile the truce is complete,

and with the assistance of a downpour of rain, Brussels is comparatively quiet, although the "Marsellaise" and "O, Van den Peerboom" are freely sung under umbrellas. At a meeting in the theater Fla-

mand last evening the speakers exhorted the populace to cintonue the fight for universal suffrage. A number of civic guards entered

with arms reversed. One of them said: "We had ten cartridges--too many for seven ministers."
