DEM COONS WON THE GAME.

DEFEATED KINGSTON AT LAKE ONTARIO PARK.

Score was 10-3—Cuban Giants Very Funny in Their Movements—Second Innings Disastrous for the Kingston Team Play again To-morrow At Lake Ontario park yesterday afternoon about three hundred of the baseball friends saw the Cuban Giants defeat Kingston. Although the score stood ten to three, yet "dem coons" will have to hustle on Friday to defeat the local team at the "diamond oakwalk." The Cuban team contains only three of those who played here last September, but it is composed of better ball players. The antics of the coons are very comical, and drew forth much laughter. Unlike their white brothers, they chatter and play the game at the same time. They all catch and field well, their work in this respect being quick and exact. Sampson, their pitcher yesterday, did good work, and his bats did not find the Kingston players' bat for some time. There are some lucky players on the Darkeytown team, but the Goliath among them is the second baseman.

It was half-past four when the game started. Half of the spectators were seated in the grand stand, in which a string orchestra was stationed. The teams were: Cuban Giants—Smith, 2b; Graham, c; Sampson, p; Bell, s.a.; Drew, 3b; Brown, o.f.; Gailey, r.f.; Watkins, lb; Manning, i.f.

Sullivan was unable to pitch and his absence was greatly missed. Robinson pitched a very good game, with the exception of the second innings, when six hits were made off him. He held the Giants down from the third innings, no runs being scored by the visitors in the last six innings. After the first, when neither team scored a run, some money was put upon the local men, but the nine runs in the second decided the winners. In that innings the Cubans' hard batting and three miserable errors of the Kingston team proved disastrous. Up to the end of the fourth innings only three Kingston players, Carson, McCraig and McRae, reached first base. Kingstone, however, soon loomed up, put on a winning gait, and many who were looking for a car decided to remain and see the fight to a finish. In the eighth McRae made three brilliant plays, throwing two men out at first and catching a foul fly. In the same innings Kingstone had three men on bases. McRae hit and Young went out at home, while the former was called out on first. McCraig caught two pretty flies in the Cubans' last innings. Smith, the visitors' second baseman, made a pretty double play in the ninth.
