G. A. Hibbard, of the firm of Shole & Hibbard, sailors, Watertown, N.Y., was drowned off Bull Rock Point on Monday afternoon while fishing.

Search is being made about Cornwall for James Ryan, a negro, accused of murdering a canal employee named Kelly at Massena Springs, N.Y.

A bill is before Manitoba legislature giving Winnipeg authority to submit the question of Sunday street cars to the people. Its second reading was adopted with speaker's vote.

On Saturday next the steamer New York will bring a large party of excursionists to the city from Clayton, N.Y. The A. O. H., of Syracuse, will be taking their annual outing.

TWO MEN AFTER ONE GIRL.

Supposed to Have Been Killed By A Hawk.

CHATEAU, Conn., July 18.—Harry Chadwick called on Miss Mary South Sunday night. He left on his wheel about 10:30 for his home in New Britain. His wheel, covered with blood, and his watch and cuffs, were found yesterday near Clark's creek, which he had to cross. Indications were that a body had been dragged to the river. A young man named Hough boarded with the Smith family. He also was attentive to Miss Mary Smith. A blood spotted ladder rested against the side of Hough's second story room, was also found. Hough lay on his bed unconscious, with a cut five inches long in his neck. He is supposed of having waylaid and killed Chadwick and having been wounded in the fight. Hough's condition is critical. The river is being dragged for Chadwick's body.

TRAMP KILLED.

Grim Ending of a Sunday Morning Theft—Stole From Priest.

BAY ST. PAUL, Que., July 18.—Coroner Gauthier has been asked to hold an inquest on the body of a tramp killed at Pointe Riviere, St. Francois, after committing a theft at the presbytery during the celebration of mass on Sunday. The servant at the presbytery perceived the presence of a thief in the house and gave the alarm. Four parishioners started after the thief and met him in the woods. One of the men shot him and the wound proved fatal. It is said he shot too hastily, but it is also asserted that he acted in self defense. The thief having shown a revolver and knife. The sum of \$15 and a watch said to have been stolen were found on the body. The coroner will investigate.

Rogers' Challenge To Durlan.

BROCKVILLE, July 18.—Ex-mayor Booth is in receipt of a letter from W. H. Hanson, of New York, in which he says Rogers, the sculler, is anxious to meet Eddin Durlan for \$500 or \$1,000 a side, the race to take place on Saratoga lake on September 15th. He says if Durlan will put up \$200 it will be covered for either of the above amounts. When spoken to to-day about the matter, Durlan said he had not yet considered the challenge. Durlan defeated Rogers at Boston in 1893, and at Halifax in 1896.

Secured Good Help.

MONTREAL, July 18.—Principal George of the Congregational college has returned from England, where he has succeeded in interesting the Congregational union in the works of the college here and obtained a guarantee of \$1,500 for each of the next three years to enable the curriculum to be extended. He also interested the union in Canada as a field of immigration, and two delegates will come out here next month to look over the ground.

The Pope's Resolve.

LONDON, July 18.—The Rome correspondent of the Telegraph says: "The pope is resolved to conduct personally the religious ceremonies opening the century. He will inaugurate them with the holding of a consistory, at which the archbishop of Santiago de Chili will be given a cardinal's hat and other important changes will be made among the South American prelates."

Mr. Noxon's Plan.

TORONTO, July 18.—Inspector Noxon favors building a new reformatory for boys at a cost not exceeding \$50,000 and using the old reformatory building at Penetanguishen for epileptics. There is accommodation for 500 such patients at Penetanguishen, and Mr. Noxon thinks they could be employed to advantage on the lands contiguous, comprising 1,000 acres.

Soda Water Generator Explodes.

BROCKVILLE, July 18.—H. H. Cassell, one of Brockville's leading confectioners, was nearly killed by the explosion of a soda water generator at his store. The explosion smashed the machine and the windows of the room. Mr. Cassell was removed to hospital, badly cut on the forehead and arm. He was also generally bruised and his legs burned with acid.

System Below Quebec Must Be Changed.

MONTREAL, July 18.—Hon. J. I. Tarte writes to L. Patrick, Lord Liverpool, that it is the bounden duty of the government to take rigorous and immediate measures to change from beginning to end the light house and signal system now in vogue below Quebec and Bel's I-Is. He says the present system no longer meets the requirements of the case.

Grand Trunk Unable to Track.

MONTREAL, July 18.—The Grand Trunk is now carrying on the following sections of double track, viz: From St. Lambert to St. Hubert, one and a half miles; from St. Anne to Verdun, four miles, and from Murray Hill to Trenton and Sydenham, one and a half miles, the whole involving an expenditure of \$80,000.

Climbed the Waterpout.

LONDON, July 18.—Hon. Charles Gordon, nephew of the marquis of Huntley, and an officer of the Gordon Highlanders, called at the house of his cousin early in the morning, and, failing to arouse him, climbed to the roof by clinging to the waterpout. He lost his hold, fell to the ground and was killed.

Tired Of Service At Rights-Five.

LONDON, July 18.—Sir James Vaughan, the well known Bos street magistrate, announces that he is about to retire, after thirty five years' service in the principal London police court. He is eighty five years old, but is remarkably active both mentally and physically.

First Under New Treaty.

YOKOHAMA, July 18.—A triple marriage of an American named Ward and two Japanese women, the supposed cause being jealousy, brings on American sailor named Miller under the Japanese law as the suspected murderer. This is the first case under the new treaties.

LONDON, July 18.—Miss Ellen Barb Yaw, the young American soprano, who sings "O above the high 'C,'" has been engaged to sing in a new opera which Sir Arthur Sullivan is writing, with special songs to suit her phenomenal notes.
