

A man of massive form and intellect has fallen in the person of Robert G. Ingersoll, lawyer, critic, phitosopher and humanibarian. He stood for culture in all ite forms, and embodied in his home, his as. I sociations, his ideas of refinement. He was a deep reader and shinker, and had the distinction of reasoning along lines at least characteristic if not original.

The life of this man is a study. It is marked by incidents, by service, by experience. Politically as well as religiously be had bie changes of belief.
