

The most unfavorable circumstance we have to contend with at present is the rapid expansion of our protected industries and the formation of trusts and combines known to be going on. All protected manufacturers and their advocates both in and out of parliament maintain that in the absence of protective tariffs their products would, sell less than it costs to produce them; and there can be little doubt of the truth of this contention.
