A special meeting of the city council was held last evening to consider the markets folls question. Mayor Ryan presided and these members answered the roll call: Alds. Cooke, Craig, Cunningham, Donnelly, Webster, Graham, Kent, Mc Cartney, McFarlane, McLeod, Minnes Shaw, Taylor, Toye, Walkem and

Drennan read a certificate from the deputy returning officer, declaring Charles R. Webster elected by acclamation in Victoria ward to replace Juseph Fortescue, deceased. It was mored by Alds. Donnelly and Minnes that alderman Webster's name be placed on the list of committees in place of that of the late alderman Fortescue, Adopted.

Mayor Ryan intimated that the meeting was specially called to consider market boll privileges, but the meeting was at the disposal of the members.

Ald. White, chairman of the city property and markets committee, gave an outline of the transaction, re the receiving of tenders, calling of meetings of the committee, the non attendance of members and the opening of tenders by himself, the mayor and city solicitor. As per opinion of the city solicitor the present meeting was called to dispose of the tenders. The *peaker presented this resolution : "That the tenders of John Daly, being the highest for market No. 1, namely, \$1,200, and that also his tender for market No. 2. for \$360, be accepted, and that the solicitor be instructed to prepare the necesary lease to have this carried out."
