THE BIG ROAD RACE RUN.

**THE FORMER RECORD WAS NOT
BROKEN.**

**A Young Kingston Boy Wins First Position
Prize—A Heavy Wind Retarded The
Progress Of The Wheelmen—Two Men
Lost Their Places Through Their Own
Error.**

The Kingston bicycle club has another big success to add to its long list of brilliant undertakings. The club has been particularly fortunate in having fine weather favor all its meets, and as a result thousands are attracted here to participate in and witness the programmes of events. Yesterday's meet did not materially differ from those of other years. The schedule included practically the same events as in former years. One of the most attractive events on the list was the big twenty mile road race, conducted by the Canadian century club under the auspices of the Kingston bicycle club. This noted event, over the York road course, recognized as the fastest in Ontario, drew many riders to the city, but not as many as would have been gathered together had it not been for the world's meet, in progress in Montreal. As it was a good field of noted riders presented themselves and went over the course in very good time.

The weather favored the big race in every particular save one, and that was the prevalence of a stiff north wind, which made the home stretch a long, hard pull. The wind aided the riders on the out going, but played old hob with them on the home run. The race was witnessed by many thousands of persons, who gathered in the fair grounds, where the event began and finished, and in the streets adjacent thereto.

It was 10:22 o'clock when the first bunch of riders got away and eight minutes later the scratch men were speeding away on their twenty-mile spin, endeavoring to head off the leaders of the handicap. The men were sent off in this order:

VIEWS ON THE TRANSVAAL.

REV. DR. GRANT AND THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.

The Principal of Queen's University Considers British Policy Unjust and Canadian Interference Unwise. Principal Grant in Toronto Globe.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4—I have been in hospital here for three weeks, dependent for news on the New York daily papers, which give snippets concerning Canada, small in space and generally smaller in other respects. Coming out to-day restored in health, I see by the Globe that parliament has passed a resolution of condemnation on the Transvaal and of sympathy with her majesty's government in its efforts to obtain political rights for the Uitlanders.

As the parliament of Canada is supposed to speak for Canadians, permit me to offer dissent on the ground, first, that the policy of Britain, in challenging the independence of the Transvaal, making at the same time ostentatious preparations for war, as a part of its moral pressure, is unwise and unjust; secondly, that the interference of Canada is a mistake unless we intend, in the event of the republic standing on its rights, to support the mother country with aid, which parliamentary resolutions usually supposed to imply.

As to the merits of the dispute, the Transvaal is making a bad thing worse by grudging the franchise to the natives. It is only one of the same kind of things that Great Britain has made again with perfect honesty. In the century did she grant the franchise to the Jews, Roman Catholics, and masses of her people.
