## IS NOT AN EXTREME VIEW

TO ALLOW SOME PROVINCES TO PROHIBIT LIQUOR.

The Majorities In Favor of Prohibition Outside of Quebec-Speech of Hon. Mr. Sifton.-Give Them The Hight.

He felt that those provinces having by large majorities voted for pro hibition had a right to demand that parliament should put it within their power to prohibit the evil to which they had the employment of Capt. Bruce Carruthere. declared their hostility. It was not a proper thing to ignore or neglect the voice of these provinces. The proposition for pro hibition by provinces was feasible.
