BOSNIAN ASSAILANT OF KING MILAN MEETS NIKOLITCH.

The Latter Says His Accuser is a Lying Rascal and Milan Himself "a Shameful Traitor" - Abonymous Proclamations Oniling For Dethronement and Banishment of Alexander and Milas.

Moscow, Aug. 28 -Despatches from Belgrade tell of a scandalous confrontation between Giura Knejevitch, the Bosnian assailant of exking Milan, and Col. Nikonich, charged with having concected the plot of which Kneje. vitch is alleged to have been only the instrument. Col. Nikolitch, who might be permitted to denounce Knejevitch, burt his case by including in his condem. nation king Alexander's father. He branded Knejsvitch as a lying raccal. denied any sort of connection with his murderous attempt, and challenged Milan, as "a shameful traitor," to do his worst. "I am not sfraid," he said. "An honest the extreme danger of allowing entrance soldier prefers death to paying homage to a brigand who kills patriots, who has robbed Servia's treasury, and has sullied

BRITISH GUNS COW RUSSIANS.

Warship Threatens the Consulate at Hankow-Fight is Narrowly Averted.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 28. -As the outcome of a dispute regarding the possession of some land at Hankow, about seven hundred miles from the sea, purchased in 1865 by the concern of Jardine Matheson, & Co., but was subsequently included in the new concessions to Russia, the o wners under the advice and protection of Mr Harst, the British consul, sent workmen to fence in the tract.

After the work had been commenced dez in Cossacks from the Russian consulate appeared on the scene and forcibly ejected the workmen.

The captain of the British second class gunboat Woodlark, specially designed for river service, after consulting with Mc Hurst, landed a party of blue jackets, and moved the Woodlark into firing distance of the Russian consulate. For a time a fight seemed imminent, but nothing further occurred. The bluejackets are now guard-

ing the property.

CLEVELAND, Ohic, Aug. 28 -The steam. er which burned off Fairport Friday night was the Sir S. H. Tilley, a Canadian vessel of 750 tons. The fire started in the engine room and spread so rapidly that the engineer did not have time to shut off steam, and the crew and passengers, about twenty in number, had difficulty in escaring.

All the members of the crew save two and three women passengers and the cook were placed in the life boat and rowed to the steamer's consort. Two of the crew remained on board the burning vessel and, after lashing the wheel, escaped, one of them on a batch cover and the other with a life preserver. They were both picked up


