He had been camping with a party on the lake shore to the east of Mimico, and promised go swimming at four o'clock

The spot as which he entered was rough owing to a fresh wind, and the moment the doctor reached the water a billow struck him and the undertow carried him out with it. After being tossed about for twenty five minutes, the doctor's body was cast ashore near where be went in. Dr. Godfrey, of Mimico, tried to restore animation, but without success. "I do not think it will be denied that we have exhibited patience unwhat some profane wag has called paralleled in the relations between a paramount and a subordinate state. The situation is too fraught with danger: it is too strained for indefinite postponement. The knot must be loosened, to use Mr. Balfour's words, or else we shall have to find other wevs of untvine it. "If we are forced to do that, then I would repeat now words used by lord Salisbury in the house of lords I say that if forced to make further preparations, if this delay continues much longer, we shall not hold ourmatter in hand, we will not let go until we have secured conditions which, once for all, will establish us as the paramount power in South Africa, and secure for our subjects there those count rights and privileges promised by president Kruger when the Transvaal's independence
