#### RUSSIA STRIKES ENGLAND. oly Russian Ships Can Ply Between Black

Sea and East. London, Aug. 31 .- From a state ment made at the annual meeting of the Shell transport and trading company it appears that Russia has struck a serious blow at English trade in the Black sea

It was stated that the Russian government had passed a law which comes into effect in 1900, prohibit ng all ships not flying the Russian ing from trading between the Black sea and Russian possessions in the far east. At the end of this year the company's ships could, therefore, no longer ply between Batoum and Vladivostock, and so the board would be forced to sell the plant at the latter place. Thirty-eight per cent. of the petitions in 1899 related to marriages that came within those limits; thirty per cent, more between five and ten; only eleven per cent. for twenty years and upwards. The chief classes to which petitioners for divorce belong are dealers in articles of food, publicans, hotelkeepers, etc. engineers and architects, and (bracketed) seamen and actors and musi-

To the very poor the divorce court is, apparently, a practically inaccessible tribunal. Now there is a matter for long and curious meditation. Why should the second and the third decade of married life be more perilous than the earlier and later ones? There must be reason in these apparent mysteries if we could only know it.

## ABOUT THE PENITENTIARY.

· Ficket of Leave" System -- Benefit by Trade

Instruction.

The new "ticket of leave" system comes into effect at the Kingston penitentiary next month. This system was recently de eided upon by the dominion parliament and is as follows: A prisoner enters the penitentiary sentenced to a certain number of years confinement. If he behaves him self well and has no reports made again t him, during a certain proportion of he term, he is liberated. Perhaps may serve only two years out of a sentence of five. His liberation, nowaver, is conditional. The released man's intentions are recorded before he leaves she penitentiary, and he is fully instructed se to what is required of him in return for having thus been released. He must re port to the megietrate or justice of the peace in the place to which he goes, and must do this at certain regular periods antil his sentence which he should have served in prison, has terminated. Then he is a free man, but notil that time has expir-

he will also be returned to fit ish his sen tence within closed walls This new system will serve as an experiment, and will have the eff.ct of keeping he hardened criminals in a class by them salves. It will be a godrend to those unfursunates who get into trouble through other than criminal modives, and will give them a chance to reform.
