

TAKING IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

SUPPOSING IT SHOULD ENTER CONFEDERATION?

Queada Must Then Assume "The White Man's Surden" For a Time-Her Cour. age Would Sarmount The Difficulty-The Island Would Soon Become Belf-

Supporting-A Menance As It is The Canadian Furniture and Upholstery Journal issues this week a confederation number in which the admission of Newfoundland to the dominton is discussed. The opinions of scores of Canadians are given. Edw. J. B. Pense, president of the Kingston board of trade, expressed

theea views : "On all considerations of imperial con-

cern and Canadian national solidity, the linking of Newfoundland with the confederation would be most commendable. It would be more than the fulfilment of mere political centiment; it would round up and complete British America as one great country, undivided in interest and aims and national spirit la its isolated and practically self governing condition, the cology is a menace to the standing of all Canada. The exercise of a desire for reciprocity might at any time endanger the cause of Canada in dealing with the United States. Though small in proportion to the vast dominion, io would be given very favorable terms at any time in order to weaken Canada's portion as an independent nation by comperison and precedent. Then political unity would bring the lead ing men of Newfoundland into close touch with the members of parliament and the

merchants of our great cities, and there is nothing like acquaintance and a common interest for promoting trade. Canada has not the show she should have the traffic with Newfoundland, though prospects are brightening as the railroad across the province is being procecuted and as the hopes of a quick passage through Canada by way of Newfoundland

to Europe grow materially. But while Canada gaine in these particulars, it would have no easy task in dealing with the very difficult questions which have made Newfoundland a place of deep concern to the imperial government It will require more than any province has ever done, the foetering hand of the general government. It requires financial help and diplomatic guidance in several ways. Its schools are still being aided by church societies in the old land, as they are condurted by the different religious branches in the prevince, to whom provincial funds are given for disturse ment educationally. While Canada, in holding out a hand, is fulfilling national and imperial interests, to would also be taking upon itself a white man's burden, but the courage which has inspired her to build great national rail ways, magnificent canals and other public works, admired all the world over, would sustain her in her full duty, even at a cost. Under the impetus of western trade, de veloped by a new national friendship, Newfoundland must progress materially, and in a short time would be self-sustaining-a comfort to every new ally and pro-



THE WHOLESALERS' TRUST.

WILL IT EVER BECOME A RE-ALITY?

The Two Sides of the Question—It Means More Than Most People Imagine-The Evil That it would accomplish-Preventative Legislation is Necessary for The wholesale grocers' syndicate.

brought to a sure conclusion, means more to the people of Ontario than they imagine. There are more things in it than are dreamed of in the public's philosophy. Looking it has already been established, it presents a multiplicity of unfair, unust conditions. It is nothing more than a gigantic trust, the first of its kind that has disturbed the equilibrum of Canadian trade and engrossed the public mind. We see the workings of the trusts and the monopolies in the United States, and daily hear of small concerns being swallowed up by this manyneath its rapidly advancing tread. Louis F.
