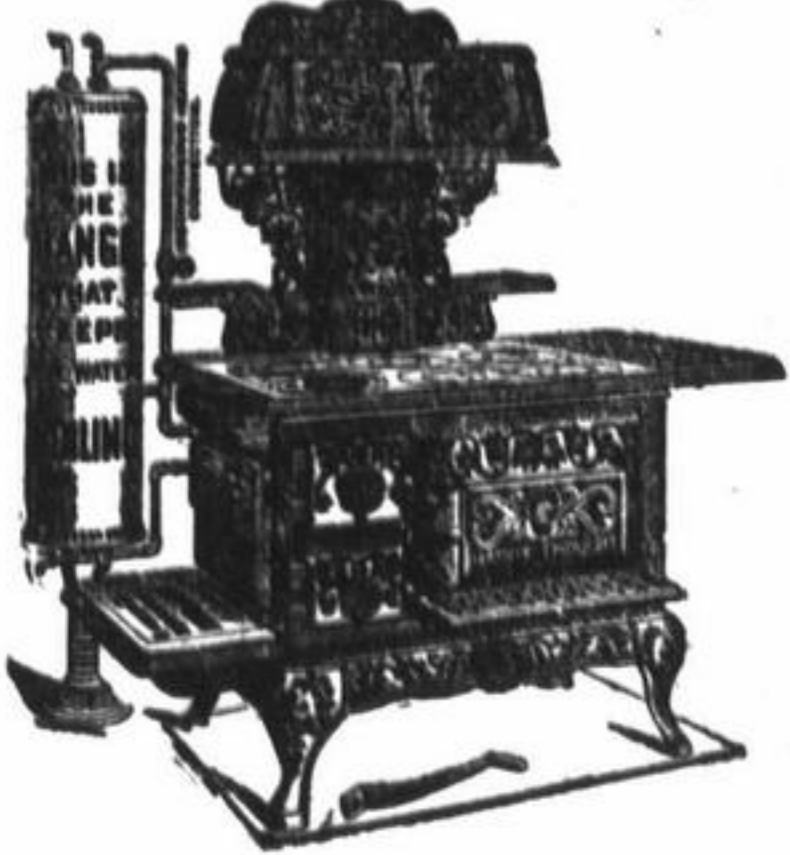

IT HITS THE YANKEES HARD

EXPORT LAW ON LOGS CAUSED GREAT HAVOC.

Their Plants Worth Over Five Millions Said to be Worthless—Must Have Canadian Timber at Any Cost. New York, Sept. 9.—Regarding the petition of right filed by the Michigan lumbermen in the Ontario courts against the Ontario legislation prohibiting the export of logs, the Commercial prints to-day a number of interviews with American lumbermen on the subject. The interviews were like this: "The log export law of the province of Ontario caused a great havoc among the saw mills at Saginaw, Bay City and other points in the Saginaw valley and on the lower peninsula of Michigan," said D. J. Becker, of the white pine lumber firm of C. L. & J. Becker, "Lower Michigan is pretty nearly all logged off by this time, and it amounted practically to a matter of salvation for the mills there to get logs from Canada."

Kingston, Sept. 9.—(To the Editor.) I noticed an article in last night's issue concerning the question of domestic and deploring the fact that servant girls are scarce and difficult to obtain, and was ever so glad to you to assign a reason for this scarcity of female help? It is not so much the fact that other lines of labor prove more alluring to them, as the fact that the employment other than domestic affords more freedom and less tyranny. In some cases girls are allowed out for an hour just as soon as their work is done up after supper, but I know of places where the girls are not allowed out until nine o'clock, and are then given until eleven o'clock to themselves.
