

T. W CASEY CONTINUES HIS INTERESTING ARTICLES.

The Newburg Academy-It Was a Famous Institution - Its Destruction by Fireheveral Kingstoulans Connected With

Continuing his old-time records of the early days at this province, published in the Napanee Beavor, T. W. Casey speaks of the Newburgh academy which for years was one of the best of its class in the province. So famous was this institution of learning that pupils came from the Babama Islands to attend it The first aca demy was established at Newburgh about 1840, and owed its existence largely to three enterprising citizens, viz: Kev. Isaac Brock Ayleworth, M D, George Eakine and Robert Foreythe Hope. About 1850 in was found necessary to build a larger building and consequently the "new stone academy" was srected. In was about this time that the Newburgh Index was first established by I B. Aylesworth, now ex president of the London Methodist conterence. Mr. Beach soon succeeded him as editor. C. V. Price, now judge Price, of Kingston, succeeded Mr. Beach in the editorial chair Mr Beach ret red from the school and was succeeded by Rev. William Lewin, who taught from 1858 to 1865. After several years of successful teaching he rasigned, and assumed the duttes of an Anglican clergyman. He is now a retired minister residing in King-

John Campbell, M A., came next. In his day the academy recembled an English classic echool; young men from a discuce resided in the principal's house. All ed McCiatchie, MA, taught from 1871 o 1875. Later followed a nepbew of th great Thomas Carlyle. Peter L Dorland and T. M. Henry, M A, now principal of Napanee collegiate, followed. Charles W. Williams was principal at the time of the great fire in 1887 and won many friends among his pupils. Three masters are now employed at the school.
