

"I also believe a reduction in the num ber of aldermen would be beneficial. Every body familiar with city council matters knows that the burden of the work of the civic body is always performed by the minority. Then why have a large, cumbersome council when a smaller body will suf tice? I think the number of aldermen should not exceed fourteen, though that is the maximum number; less than that would be preferable. Seven, or half the body, should be elected for two years, so as to allow one half the council being elect ed annually. This would ensure a continuity of the work of the council, as half the body would always be familiar with measures and projects in hand, and the civic machine would proceed each year without a hitch

"I think changes on these lines would result in economy, closer attention to the city's work and general satisfaction to the people. In some of the municipalities that have adopted this system every member of the council is made a member of all work ing committees, thereby ensuring a thorough knowledge of all business and work done by the com ittees within the council. As nearly all the work of the council is done in committees it is very important to have every alderman familiar with mattors pertaining to the city, but under the prosent system this is not possible.
