AN ENGLISH MISER.

Was Possessed Of Plenty, But Died Of

London, Sept. 25.-There died in the parish infirmary, Shepherdess walk, City road, Friday afternoon, an opera-glass maker named Moulder, who had been found dying of age, want, and neglect in the two attice which he occupied at 126 Pentonville road.

Moulder, who was seventy-three years of age, was removed from his rooms by the relieving officer on Monday, and yesterday the police and parish officer on making a search discovered in a cupboard close to where he was found dying a hoard of several hundreds of pounds in gold, besides valuable securities.
