Capitalists Propose to Erect a Plant At

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 28 - There seems to be no doubt that a great tobacco fac tory, a rival of the Continental and the American prosecco companies, is soon to be in operation in this city. A conference was held at the Galt house in this city reveral days ago, in which those who propose to embark in this scheme were present and stated plainly what sums of money could be counted upon for such a venture. While nothing like the \$50, 000,000 involved in the American tobacco company were mentioned, it was settled beyond all question that the new concern would have at least \$2 000,000 capital. Most of this money will be drawn direct from the Continental. It is said that David A. Kellar, recretary of the Continental, at the head of the new movement, and John Whiteman, a leading tobacco morchant here, is also a prominent figure in
