From Floridia there come tidings of great prosperity in the phosphate industry This industry was developed in 1888. The supply is enormous and the ruling prices are high. There are several bundred phosphate concerns in Florida, some of which are foreign. During the ten months ending May 1st, 1899, the exports of American phosphate amounted to nearly \$5,000,000, of which \$1,750,000 worth went to Germany, \$600,000 to Britain, \$400,000 to France, and \$1.200,000 to other European countries. This year there is a market in Asia for \$500,000 worth of American phosphate. The peace in Cuba will aid the business between that country and Florida.

The Hop Situation.

There is no change in the Toronto hop situation; the offeringe are light, being confined to a few bales, and the demand is slow. Local dealers quote 20c to 21c for new Ontario bops. Not much credence is attached by local dealers to a report recently cabled from London to the effect that only one third of the crop in Sussex and Kent, the two principal hop counties in England, would be hervested owing to damage.
