pistols, and they surrendered accordingly. Adams made them give up their weapons and marched them in front of him, by a back road, to the British headquarters. The British commander was so pleased with the exploit that he made the captives a present of the horses, and the animals spent the rest of their days in helping to clear up their master's farm. And the joke of it was, Adams did not have even a single charge for his musket when he made his capture.

"Just before the Americans were retaken," continued Mr. Cook, "they threw a thousand dollars overboard from one of their boats. The coin still lies in the soft mud at the bottom of the river. After the battle Lieutenant Ingalls was stationed in our house, with a guard. This guard remained for a good deal of the winter, and mother baked bread for the men. The bread cost one shilling; flour was \$17 a barrel then; still have a box that belonged to Mr. Ingalls. It is about 18 x 12 inches and a foot deep. The wood is still in very good state of preservation, but the copper fastenings are all gone."

Nelson Casselman, who lives about midway between Mr. Cook's place and the old Cryster homestead, is a grandson of the Casselmans, who lived there when the battle was fought.

The house (a frame one) in which he lives now, is the one his grandparents occupied on the day of the battle. The beams which support the floor of the upper story are about eight by four inches, and are about one inch thick, and were hewn by hand with a broad ax nearly 100 years ago.

The floors are made of lumber which was whit-sawed by Mr. Casselman's grandfather, with the help of neighbors. In the main room, on the east side of the house, is a great stone fireplace nine feet wide, four feet across, and five feet high. The front is broken up now, and the great crane on which the pots swayed nearly a century ago is hidden, after falling twice in dashes, confined to return home. On getting back as far as the barn he found his younger brother Charlie in the presence of a group of American officers, who were trying to find out where Col. Cryster was. One even offered the little fellow his watch if he would tell, but all they could get out of the lad was that the colonel had gone to the horse stable.

"After the battle," said he, "three wounded Americans were brought into this room, and laid down on the floor. The one who was most severely wounded was an old man whose hands of life would not have held out much longer in any case. As he lay across the waters of the St. Lawrence, clattering under the cold northeast of November after noon, memories of the home on the other side of the river came back upon him like a flood, and he said he would die content if he could but once more see the children and grandchildren of whom he had never been separated. He died before morning, and was buried with the other dead in the hastily prepared trench that was dug over there just east of the house, where part of our orchard now stands."

"The original Cook tavern is gone, but in its place there stands, a few yards from the old site, an imposing brick structure that was erected by the Americans. The original log cabin, which was built around the fireplace, has disappeared, but the Americans carried off the stones and used them to build a new one, which stands to this day.

"There is one man still living who was actually there when the struggle took place. This is Elias Cook, a cousin of H. H. Cook, of Toronto. Yes," said the old gentleman, his eye kindling as the memories of the past began trooping back to him, "I was there. I was not engaged in the battle, though in fact, I knew little about it at the time. I was only a year old, and my mother took me and the other children into the cellar to be out of the way. When we all ran to the bushes, the Americans appeared. What would you have done?" The enemy came suddenly and the women were powerless to resist. But the women could not run fast enough to get away, and they stayed behind with the children. When the battle began, my mother took me and the other children into the cellar to be away from the flying bullets. As our place had been seized by the Americans, for their headquarters a couple of British gunboats put in, and the Americans gave special attention to the tavern. They fired a number of shots, but none of them hit the house.
