

RESPECTING THE LAW.

The game inspector will do himself and the government he represents justice by enforcing the game laws with all the vigour he commands. Across the way, in New York state, the law has been made so exacting that hunting is not a pleasure, and it is only a few days since an Ameri can print rejoiced that Canadians were so liberal in their regulations.

Canada has, it seems, at the instance of the railway companies, passed an act ac cording to which there may be an exporta tion of deer; and this fact is gleefully re ferred to for two reasons, (1) that the American hunters, and (2) that the change in the law may have an affect in protecting indirectly the deer in the American forests.

The feeling is that Canada has become unnecessarily and unappreciatively kind. What special interest could the railway companies have in the sporting business that they should, as credited, make special efforts in the interests of the huntsmen? Canada has as much need for guarding the game as the Americans, and it has cousins that they cannot make a general stamping ground of our forests, doing in them what they will not be permitted to do at home. It is expected that all visitors will be treated in a courteous way, but this courtesy must not be taken ad vantage of to do illegal things. Yet the game inspector has been called upon al ready to prosecute certain parties who have come from New York state on sport in defiance of all laws and regulations. .

It is just possible that the concession made in the amended law has been a mis take, and that the sooner Canada gets back to its old restrictions the better.
