

Washington, D.C., Oct. 18 .-- Consul McCook, Dawson City, has sent to the state department a statement prepared by Messrs. Acklin and Marley regarding the agricultural possibilities of the Yukon territory which indicates that the country capable of producing wheat, oats and barley, and ordinary vegetables and nowers. The statement is from practical agriculturalists and gardeners, and is as follows:

"Sir: In submitting to you our views and experiences of what can be grown successfully here, we do so hoping that it may prove of benefit to your department and to the people at large. Experiments were commenced in 1898 by Mr. Acklin and proved successful with the following : Radishes, lettuce, carvegetables: rots, turnips, peas, rutabagas and Siberian kale. "For the season of 1898 we have tried both flowers and vegetables. some wheat, barley and and also

proved very successful. you a list of the varieties of flowers, vegetables and grain grown, the dates of sowing, planting, and maturing of crop, as near as possible . "Flowers — Pansies, china vinks, cornflower, centaureas three varieties, stocks giant perfecchrysanthemums, dahtion, annual ins, nasturtiums, sweet beas, mignon-tte, gabrielle calendulas, aero-

oats, which have, taken as a whole,

'Vegetables-Leeks, lettuce, parsand celery, cauliflower, cabbage. "The foregoing plants were transplanted to the open ground from May 10th to June 1st, inclusive. The flowers commenced blooming very quickly; the first pansies were picked July 4th; shirley poppies June 27th: the remaining flowers doomed in profusion by the second week of July, excepting the dahlias. which, from all appearances, will only make tubers this year and be shape for the season of

"On May 3rd we sowed fifteen varieties of sweet pens in the open ground; they were in bloom in seven weeks from time of sowing.

'Vegetables were sown outside on the following dates. We have not kept the exact date when we commenced marketing the different varieties, but it is sufficient to say that they grow as well and mature as quickly as in Vermont, Minnesota

and other northern states: "April 24th-Radishes April 26th -Peas (American wender), prickly spinach, English mustard, kale, lettuce of all varieties. 10th--Carrots (Danvers half and ox heart), turnips (flat Dutch) May 24th-Beans (broad Windsor, golden wax. Wardwell's kidney wax, wonder, etc.), parsnips, rhubarb (Victoria and Scott's mammoth), cucumber (Boston market white spine) onions (Danvers, yellow, queen, etc.) May 27th -- Transplanted cabbage. leeks, cauliflower, and parsley. make frequent sowings of radishes and lettuce, as they mature more quickly than any other vegetable.
