A SERMON TO ORANGEMEN.

CHARGES CANADIAN CABINET WITH BIGOTRY.

Catholic Chaplain for Fifty Men-Would Not Preach on Catchy Subjects-House of God Not a Concert Hell-Plain Words.

Nov. 6.—Rev. A. W Steacy, of St. John's Episcopal church, preached a sermon to Orangemen yesterday. he said, "is given to the sworn supporters of the altar and throne by the great Catholic church. In the previous year, however public penance in a white sheet was done in a country church in Essey and a similar thing occurred in Dit ton church, near Cambridge, in 1849


