MARINE EXPRESS BOAT.

It fins Been Put in Service-Preparations OTTAWA, Nov. 9 -Graham Moon, of the

post office department, has launched his marine express boat. It is an innovation pure and simple, and assuredly a novelty of marine construction. It is not another roller boat as some have imagined. a It is simple in its construction and comists almost entirely of four cylinders wheels, somewhat similar those of a side wheel steamer, while surmounting the whole is a large deck for passengers. The boat is twenty-four feet in length and twelve feet in width and presente a very unique appearance, en tirely differest from anything affoat. The four cylinders are each eight feet deep and four feet across and are hollow. They are covered with the sixteenth gauge of galvanized iron and are made to revolve with great case and rapidity. On the eutsida of the whoels, about six inches apart, are the small zinc cleats, which coming in contact with the water, will push ahead the boat at a good rate of speed. In between the four wheels a miniature boiler and engine of four-horse power has been installed and connected by the usual shafts with the wheels, will furnish power for locomotion. Mr. Moon fully expects the boat to attain a speed of twelve miles per hour.

And Good News May be Speedily Expected.

THE BOERS OF ORANGE FREE STATE ARE MASSING.

Buller is Taking Effective Steps to Stay Their Advance-German Artillery Said to be Aiding the Enemy-There is no Cause for Alarm Even Though Many Places Are Unprotected.

LONDON, Nov. 9 -In the absence of further news from Ladysmith, attention is now being burned to the southern frontier of the Orange Free State, where there are indications of growing Boer activity.

A despatch from Colesberg, dated Nov. 6th, says it is reported there that 3,000 burghers have lofe Pretoria to assist in the defence of the southern border of Orange Free State. It is stated that these troops are accompanied by German artillery and have quick firing gune of heavy calibre.

Queenstown, Cape Colony, the place to which the British troops fell back from Stormburg, says: "The staff of the Cape Colony railway are being withdrawn from all border stations between that point and De Arr. Four thousand Free State burghere are now in Cape Colony. and more are expected." Gen. Buller, however, has taken effective steps to check their advance. There is no cause for alarm, although Aliwal North, Burghers. dorp, Stevensburg, Molteno and Barkly East are unprotected. The censor does not allow me to particularias, but you may expect good news.

Advices from Naauwpoort, Cape Colony, fyled Monday morning, say that on learning that the Boers were relaying the rails at Norvalepout, the railway department the previous day destroyed the culvert between Arundel and Tweendale.
