THE BOERS AND ZULUS INSO-LENT TO BRITISHERS.

LONDON, Nov. 18 .- The Times prints Zaluland. "The report of further fighting at B.e. tere Station, in which our cavalry is said to have engaged, strengthens the belief that Gen. White is adopting a far sounder plan of remaining on a watchful defensive and in the meantime baraceing the enemy with mounted troops.

"Kruger's assumption that the life of one of his detectives it only balanced by the lives of six British officers is, of course, monstrous, and even if the doctrine of retaliation were pushed to the utmost limits the threat could only be regarded as a murderously unreasonable one "The duke of Connaught, formerly com-

mander at Aldershot, was amongst the first to seek employment in the war. He was even willing to waive his seniority in order to accomplish this purpose, but it was deemed inexpedient that an officer senior in rank to Gen. Buller should serve under him."

From Various Points.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—An undated despatch from Da Aar, Cape Colony, says a strong British force left there for Kimberley on Nov. 10th. When within fifty miles of the beleaguered town the relief column encountered a considerable body of the enemy. The Boers were routed after a smart brush, leaving the road clear to Kimber ley, which may now be relieved at any moment. This news bas, however, not

London, Nov. 18.—The reinforcements which up to last night had arrived in South Africa number 23,500, of which 7.290 have already disembarked at Durban. with eighteen field gune, a number of machine guns, engineers and hospital troops, well as seven hundred mules. This force, with that already between Estcourt and Darban, is considered sufficient to enable Gen. Hildyard to advance and take the aggreesive against the Boers south of Lady smith. In view of the Boer destruction bridges, the war office has issued orders for the shipment of a quantity of bridge work between this and the end of the year.
