A DEATH FROM COAL GAS.

THOMAS CONDON LOST HIS LIFE FROM POISONING. Prof. Cody, of Wycliffe College, May be Made Sector of St. James' Cathedral—Want to Know the History of a Young Man—Doctored the Firm's Books. TORONTO, Nov. 22.—Thomas Condon, aged sixty-five, one of the victims of the coal gas poisoning, died at the emergency hospital shortly before noon today. His doctor never recovered consciousness. His daughter is still unconscious, and her recovery is now very improbable. The open stove door is the only evidence as to how the tragedy occurred. There is no suggestion of suicide, the evidence going to show that the old man and his daughter had tried to reach and open the door when they awoke and found the room full of gas.

The police have received a request for information as to the history of Harry Van Zandt, held at Port Huron for housebreaking. Van Zandt is the young man who burglarized the Massey residence two years ago stealing a large quantity of silverware which he hid in the earth near Queen's park. He showed the detectives the hiding place and after a good deal of digging the silverware was recovered. For the Massey burglary he served eighteen months in the Central prison.

HER NECK WAS BROKEN.

CHAPERONE OF A PARTY WAS INSTANTLY KILLED.

A frightful accident as the result of a Runaway—deceased was a Teacher in Alma Ladies College St. Thomas—Had Been to a Concert With Lady Students. ST. THOMAS, Ont., Nov. 22.—A frightful accident occurred at midnight last night by which Miss Eleanor Moore, teacher of science and mathematics at Alma Ladies' college, was instantly killed. Miss Moore was chaperone to a number of lady students who took part in a concert at Frijol village last night. The party was coming down Blackwood hill, on the edge of the city, on the way home the line broke, and the horses getting beyond control of the driver, the occupants of the vehicle were thrown out. Miss Moore was instantly killed, her neck being broken. The others escaped without serious injury. Miss Moore was appointed to her position in the college in September. She was an able and popular teacher and her death has spread a gloom over the city. She was twenty-five years of age, her home being in Irlington, Ont. An inquest is being held.

A BIG BLOCK BURNED.

A Stirring Race in St. Boniface Early This Morning. WINNIPEG, Nov. 22.—St. Boniface was badly scorched by fire this morning. The fire broke out in the basement of Gullbaul's store about eleven o'clock, and before noon almost the entire block was destroyed. The work of the fire was helped by the explosion of a quantity of powder and cartridges, which were stored there. The places burned out are: Gullbaul & Cote, hardware; St. Boniface post office; Leveque, wholesale liquor; R. J. Collins, provisions; J. B. Leclair, fancy bazaar; Jolliveau, Gullbaul & Cote's warehouses; R. J. Collins' warehouse and two or three stables. With the exception of Gullbaul & Cote's store, which is a double brick building, all the buildings were frame. The tremendous heat caused a great deal of damage to Chamberlain's hotel, occupied by M. Couture; Defoy's pharmacy and several smaller stores on the other side of the street. The Royal clock, a two story brick building containing five big stores next to the block, is now on fire and in all probability will be destroyed.
