OUR FORCES MOVED THROUGH A STORM OF BULLETS.

The Boers Retreated Eastward, Taking Their Prisoners - A Lamentable Lack of Cavairy to Pursue Phem-The Enemy Will Doubtiess the Heard From Again, CAPE Town, Nov. 24 -The Argue prints the following account of the engage wer t near Balmont between the Boers and the forces commanded by lord Mathaen On Wednesday at three o'clock in the

afternoon Balmont was shoiled by a Bri tieb advance party. A messenger return ed to the main body at Finchamps' farm and the arnilery advanced and shelled a hop ja occupied by the Boers, expalling the enemy and capturing two guns. The Boers lost thirty mon.

The position was valuable, as the Boers occupied two kopies a quarter of a mile apart commanding the plain on both sides Moreover, they conprolled the water sup ply of Finchamps' firm. The main column advanced from the farm at five o'clock towards Belmont, and camped five miles from Kathre kop.

At daybreak yes errlay the Bosts opened rifle fire at a range of 1 (00 yards on the British on the plain. The advance continued and developed into a general engagement. The artillery, working round to three sides of position to the south, west and north, eileneed the Boers. Then the infantry from the centre, which was midway between Kaffirs kep and Belmont And other New England points, kep, stormed the kopje with bayonets through a storm of bullets.



We were then marched through a pouring rain to Colenso, proceeding the next morning to the Boer camp near Ladysmith, then going by rail to Modderspruit finally arriving here on Nov. 18th.

"On the journey great numbers of burghers crowded to see us, but there was only one who made insulting remarks, the others offering us cigarettes or showing such marks of attention."
