

To Clean Fure.

Furs will look much improved if they are cleaned with bran. The bran should be placed in an earthen receptacle and heated in the oven. When hot it should be rubbed well into the fur. Flannel is the best thing to use for rubbing the bran into the fur. After the husk has remained in the garment for about half an hour shake it thoroughly to remove all particles and brush until the article is perfectly clean. Fur collars that have become soiled from rubbing against the hair may be made to look like new by using hot bran on them. Two applications of the bran, and probably three, will be neessary if the fur is badly

Care to the Eyebrows.

The eyebrows should be carefully washed every day, and a tiny brush and comb used to keep them soft and smooth. They should always be rubbed from the roots to the ends, and never the "wrong way." Vaseline should be rubbed over them once or twice a week. When they get scruffy, vaseline should be put on the spot, and they should be washed with hot water and a little soap, but on no account should they be rubbed.

The eyelashes of children may be made to grow long and curly by being clipped slightly now and then, but not he case of a grown person this would make them coarse and stubby.


