NEW YORK, Dec. 2 -A special cable to the Journal to day saye: "There has been no fresh news from the seas of war since the original deepatch telling of a terrible cor fict at the Modder river.

The censorship is the most rigid yet, and London does not know even the result of Modder river fight, and cannot tell whether it was a victory or defeat. It looks very much as though the British had met a covere cet back at the hands of Gen.
