THE CANADIAN REGIMENT AT BELMONT TO REINFORCE GEN. METHUEN.

The Canadians are accompanied by the Australian and Other Regiments—the British and the Indian Regiments.

London, Dec. 2.—The official list of the British killed and wounded at the battle of Modder river totals 438.

New York, Dec. 2.—A special cable to the Journal to day says: "There has been no fresh news from the seat of war since the original despatch telling of a terrible conflict at the Modder river.

The conscription is the most rigid yet, and London does not know even the result of the Modder river fight, and cannot tell whether it was a victory or a defeat.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 2.—It is reported that Gen. Methuen's remaining at Modder river station in order to reconstruct the bridge over the river. He is said to have been reinforced by a Highland regiment and some cavalry.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 2.—The Canadian contingent, which was rushed to De Aar immediately after its arrival, has proceeded up the line to Belmont.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—The war office has received the following from Gen. Forester Walker: Cape Town, Dec. 1.—Gen. Gatacre reports no change in the situation. Gen. Methuen's flank wound is slight. He is remaining at Modder River for the reconstruction of the bridge.

BRITISH BUYING SUPPLIES. New York, Nov. 2.—The British government has bought 300,000 cases of canned meats of American packers since the Boer war began, or 7,000,000 cases, one-third of which has been shipped as soon as it can be delivered and inspected.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—As surmised, the British dead and injured at the hard fought battle of Modder river number hundreds. Up to two o'clock this afternoon only the bare total, 438, of which seventy-three were killed, had been given out, so it is impossible to deduct from "the butcher's bill" such information regarding the nature of the fight as details as to the losses of different units generally indicate.

IS CHARGED WITH MURDER.

CHARLES FRALICK ARRESTED THIS MORNING.

The Crown has reopened the James shooting case—This is done on account of conflicting stories—Released on \$2,000 Bail.

Some surprise was occasioned this morning when it was announced that Charles Fralick, proprietor of the Union hotel, Wilkesville, had been arrested on a charge of murder. The arrest was made at nine o'clock by police constable Alken, and Fralick accompanied the constable to the police station.

He appeared before the magistrate at half past ten, and to the charge of "unlawfully slaying and killing one John James on November 15th," he pleaded "not guilty." B. M. Britton, Q. C., appeared for Fralick and J. L. Whiting, Q. C., conducted the prosecution. Only two witnesses were examined—John Hardy, county constable, and Dr. Wood, the evidence of both being the same as given at the coroner's inquest on November 15th. The magistrate committed Fralick for trial at the spring assize. Bail was accepted at \$2,000, J. W. Fralick and Charles Fralick each giving surety for half of this amount.

The case has been revived by the attorney general's department, and is done on account of the great amount of public talk on the killing of James. So many stories have been told that the crown decided it was far better to sift the matter carefully, and settle all complaints. The "foreign" detective, who was here on the case, had nothing whatever to do with the arrest. The local police have more knowledge of the affair than he could gather and they are fully competent to handle the matter. It is thought on all sides that if the coroner's inquest had been adjourned for a week or so to allow any further evidence to be produced, which was not given at that time, the case would have been at an end. As far as Mr. Fralick is concerned the reopening of the affair is much better for him, and he is well satisfied to have the fullest investigation made. In the meantime the men who were with James must be found.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

What is Transpiring in Kingston Harbor and Other Ports.

The tug Thomson and Bronson arrived to-day from Montreal.

A Montreal firm has placed in winter quarters here a number of barges, so that the grain movement from Richardson's elevator will commence as soon as navigation opens.

Montreal parties are endeavoring to purchase the wreck of the steamer St. Lawrence, which lies in the bottom of the St. Lawrence river above Prescott. They also want the steamer Caribon, lying on the bottom of the boneyard at the Messara railway. Both were wanted for their iron, owing to the advance in the price of iron.
