JOUBERT'S MEN WEARY. THEY ARE ILL AND STARVING AND OFTEN DEBERT.

The British had a stirring artillery duel near to Colenso on November 28th. The Boer guns were not only accurate but also very powerful.

London, Dec. 4.—The Daily Telegraph's correspondent at Frere says, under date of November 28th: Hundreds of Gen. Joubert's men are ill.

After an artillery duel that lasted for half an hour the British took a strong position four miles from Colenso, which they held until evening.

Col. Addison, second in command of Buller's force, watching the fight at Colenso from the bank, says that all the Boer guns were in position.
