LONDON, Dec. 4. - What scanty fresh in formation concerning the war that has come through is six days old, casting practically so further light on the general development of the cituation. MEETING WITH SUCCESS.

Capt. Lessite and his tinng of Wreckers are Doing Very Well,

A letter received to-day from Capa W. B Leeslie by his brother, James, intimates that steady and satisfactory progress being made in the wrecking operations on the steamship Scottish King, ashore in a bay in Newfoundland. At the time of writing 500 barrels of cement had been removed and cast overboard. Up wards of fifty tone of aephale had also been taken out and forwarded to New York. There remained 100 tons more which it was hoped to have out in time to allow of pumping to begin on Tuesday, 5th inch. This work was delayed somewhat on account of storms having torn away cortain bulkheads and other fixtures put up by the wreckers. Mr. Lesslie also received a number of photographs of the Scottish King and Bay State. The last named went ashore in a very exposed place. The wreckers worked for upwards of a week on her when rough weather fore ed them to quit. The Bay State was a new beat this reason and cost three quarters of a million of dellars. She has become a total wreck.
