A NEW ECHEME. Syndicate Will Furnish Steam for Heating

and Electricity for Lighting Two citizens are trying to float a rebeme that, if carried out, will revolutionize the heating of stores in the business section of the city. Their idea is to locate a steam generating plant near the foot of Princess street, the place they have their 'eye on" being in rear of W. J. Paul's tobacco.

store, where there is plenty of space for the erection of a building to meet the requirements of such a plant. They will then lay pipes through the streets in which steam will be conveyed for beating purposes, on the same principle as gas and water. The company will lay pipes to the walls buildings only, owners piping buildings and placing therein suitable coils or steam registers. After g) ing through all the buildings the exhaust steam will be returned to the boilers at the power house. It is claimed for the new echeme that by its adoption merchants will be able to thoroughly heat their stores, even the largest of them, at a cost not

exceeding \$25 a year. It will also reduce and practically remove all danger from fire during the winter months when places must be heated. The new system will do away with coal dust and ashes, and, besides, any degree of heat may be obtained at all times. In the morning merchants will find their places of business nice and warm and will not have to wait for the fire to burn up in order to warm themselves.

In connection with the heating system it is also proposed to place an electrical plant in the power house, and it is claimed that merchance and others can be furnish ed with electric incandecent lights at one cent per lamp per night. At the e prices the promoters of the scheme say that money can be made. Electric lights may be used from dusk until eleven o'clock every night if necessary; the cost will be

As to the capital required to fluat the echeme, it is stated that \$10,000 will be ample. The promoters will lay their proposition before local financiers, and if they do not take kindly to it an attempt will be made to induce outside capitalises to handle it on a guarantee.


