HOCKEYISTS AWAITING ICE.

MANY NEW TEAMS WILL MAKE APPEARANCE.

The New League in Ontario—The O. H. A. will draw up schedule on Friday—Ontario Hockey Association Pressed with Present of O. H. A.—Quebec League to give Goal Nets a Trial this Month.

Owen Sound will organize a hockey club to-night.

Buffalo has organized a hockey club and hopes to get into some league.

Galt has decided to drop out of the O. H. A. and join the Western O. H. A.

Frank D. Wordworth has been elected manager of the Ogoode hall hockey team.

The executive of the O. H. A. will meet on Friday for the purpose of drawing up the schedule.

The Crystal hockey club, of Ottawa, and the Woodstock hockey club have organized for the season.

Smith's Falls and Lanark have applied for admittance into the Central Canada curling association.

The Electric, of Peterboro, are considering the advisability of putting a team in the intermediate series of the O. H. A.

The Free Press says that the Ottawa are pleased that Council has been elected president of the Ontario football union. He was their original choice.

At New York on Saturday last Teddy Hale had ridden his hundredth consecutive century in his effort to accomplish the feat of riding a century every day.

Articles have been signed by the Royal St. Lawrence and White Bear (St. Paul, Minn.) yacht clubs for a race for the St. Lawrence cup next summer.

The Quebec senior hockey league has fixed December 23rd as the date for the experimental game between the Shamrocks and Victorias to try the merits of the goal net.

The Central Canada curling association bonspiel takes place this year at Perth.

The curlers there are up to date and know how to handle a bonspiel, and always treat their curling guests well. The Rideau club, Ottawa, now hold the bonspiel trophy.

The Montreal Herald remarks that the wisdom of adopting goal nets will suddenly break up the members of the Canadian amateur hockey league.

The public will have a sigh of relief when disputes over goals alleged to have been scored are a thing of the past.

The Montreal Nationals are going to challenge the Shamrocks for the Stanley cup. One of the conditions thrown around the Stanley cup is that to qualify to challenge for it a club must have won a championship in some recognized league. Nationals have not done so.

The directors of the Kingston skating rink intend adding a further ten feet to the length of the ice sheet which will then be 233 feet. The addition will be made to the end near Union street. On account of the lateness of the season this work was not commenced along with that now in progress.

Tom Eck has written to Louis Rubenstein, secretary of the Canadian amateur skating association, stating that he will train ten skaters this season, both amateur and professional. Norval Baptie, the Dakota cyclone, and Orlaf Rudd, the western speed skater, will race at Montreal for the Canadian championship in February. Eck is training both.

The Ottawa Free Press gives J. M. Mowat, retiring president of the O. R. F. U., this parting shot: "Of Mr. Mowat's actions in ruling out Ottawa's proxy vote, the Ottawa men simply say that it was characteristic of the Kingston man that there is no consolation left them and that is that they are rid of him."

Word comes from St. John's, Nfld., that the next challenger for the America's cup will probably be a Roman Catholic priest, Rev. P. J. O'Brien, rector of St. Patrick's church, expects to restore to British soil the famous cup, the blue ribbon trophy of yachting, which the America captured in 1851.

The annual meeting of the C. R. F. U. will take place at Montreal Saturday afternoon next. The union will wrestle with twenty-five proposed amendments to the playing rules. H. M. It is proposed to put players on side when an opponent has run five yards with the ball. Interference play will also likely receive a check. V. C. Buchanan suggests that the wings be compelled to stand on a line with the quarter backs. It is also suggested to allow appeal from decisions of referees as to interpretations of the rules. These are some of the principal suggested changes in the playing rules.

Toronto commercial league—Robertson & Co., Gillespie, Anley & Dixon, Ross Lewis & Son, J. D. Ivey & Co., H. S. Howard & Co. and W. R. Johnston & Co.

The proposition to form a league comprising Lakeside, Keena, Millbrook, Lindsay and Peterboro is meeting with favor.
