ONTARIO MINERALS.

Promised Reports On The Salt And Peat Industries.

The statement of laboratory work at the Ontario assay office, Belleville. conducted by the bureau of mines as an aid to the discovery and development of the mineral resources of the northern portion of Ontario, shows a receipt of 220 samples for examination during November. They consisted of nicety eight for gold assay, twenty three for gold and silver, thirty-five for copper, three nickel,

one platinum and one sine. The samples for complete or partial analysis comprised nine iron ores from eastern Outarie for analysis as to smelting quality, five samples of crude and manufactured peat from the peat bede in the various parts of this province which are being worked, and four rocks for partial analysis.

Most of the gold ores were sent in from the Seine River district and show more or less paying values of gold. This die trice, as well as the lower Manitou district is the scene of much activity, due to the rapid extension of the Outario and Rainy River railway and the recent improvements of the government colonization roads, thus facilitating the shipping of supplies and machinery to the numerous mining camps in the district, which hitherto were supplied by American dealers from lower Minnesota.
