LOOKING INTO THE FACTS.

The premier has been as good as his word and has appointed R. C. Clute, Q.C., of Toronto, to look into the facts attending the death of two men, Fraser and McDonald, on the Crow's Nest Pass railway.

These men were railway employees who were attacked with diphtheria, removed by wagon to a car 200 miles distant, and, in cold weather, suffered severely, and without attention.

The information reaching parliament at its last session warranted some members in saying that these men had been virtually murdered by their employers.

These commissions, by the way, are expensive, and the country is warranted in expecting that some useful purpose will be served by them.

But what about the Dugas report? It had reference to the general treatment of the men on the Crow's Nest Pass railway.

Mr. St. John, who has been singularly silent since the election, has been heard from. He has been out for an airing in Perth county, and is reported to have said that every election protest put in by the conservative party will be carried to trial, and that as a consequence there will be a great turn over, politically, in this province.

He is kind enough to wish that disaster may come somewhat slowly upon the government. He does not make any allowance for the trial of petitions against the election of conservatives, and does not seem to anticipate any change in the standing of the party.

Yet in six months he expects a seat in the legislature and in the government! He is imitating Tupper, (the baronet), who gave the Laurier government just six months in which to pass in its checks and cease to be.

DESTROYED IN AN HOUR.

Commodore Watson's Report of Destruction of Cervera's Fleet.

Washington, July 5.—If any of the Spanish ships of Cervera's squadron can be saved they will be added to the American navy.

Playa del Este Cuba, July 3.—Secretary navy, Washington. At 9:30 today the Spanish squadron, seven in all, including one gunboat, came out of Santiago and entered the bay of the city destroyed within an hour, excepting the Cristobal Colon, which was chased forty-five miles to the westward, surrendering to the Brooklyn, but was beached to prevent sinking.

Commodore Watson's concluding sentence makes it apparent that Admiral Sampson has been ordered to temporarily command the United States fleet off Santiago.

AN UNPLEASANT INCIDENT.

A German Warship Follows The American Vessels Into Manila Bay.

London, July 5.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Hong Kong says that the triumphant entry of the American fleet into Manila Bay was accompanied by an unpleasant incident for which the Germans were responsible.

When the Charleston shelled the port of Guam, the governor, believing that a salute was being fired, sent a courteous regret, stating that he was unable to respond because he was without powder.

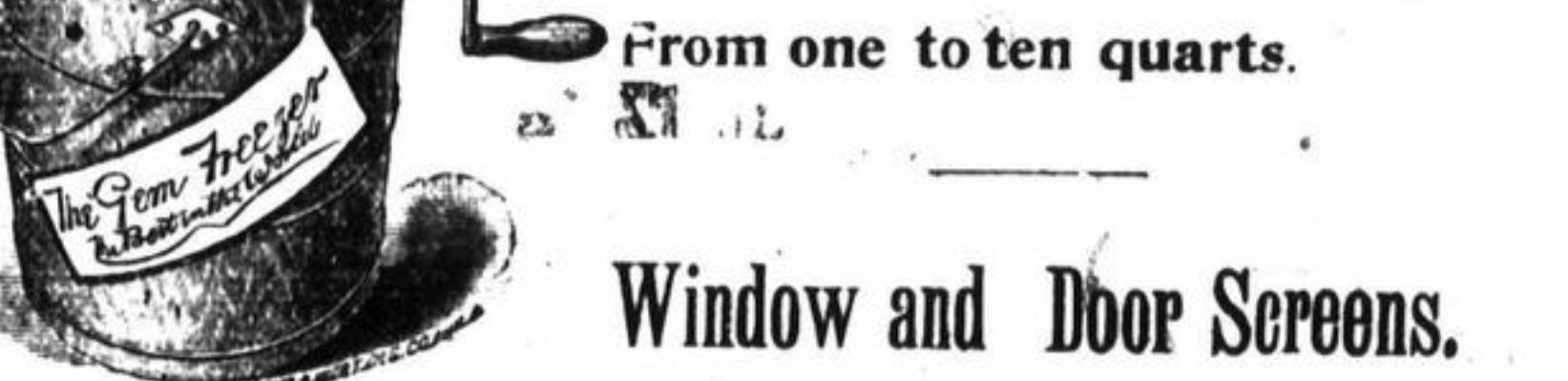
