PROF. KOCH DISCOVERS ANOTH ER, MAKING FOUR IN ALL.

He Found It In The Cameroons Hinterland, West Africa-The Disease Euden is in Inner China, Thibet, Arabia And Equatorial Africa-Nise Out of Ten Sufferers Die in Africa-Rats As Propagators.

London, July 11. - Prof. Koch announced in Berlin on Thursday the results of his investigations into the plague, which may arouse some apprehension. He declared that the view entertained ten years ago that the plague no longer threatened mankind must be abandoned. There are now no less than four plague centres, the last of which Prof. Koch discovered in the hinterland of German West Africa.

The disease is caused by bacteria and there are excellent prospects of progress in the direction of creating artificial immuni-

The part played by rate in the dissemination of the plague has been elucidated. It might be said that the plague is really a rat disease. One question, a satisfactory answer to which has not yet been given, relates to the ultimate origin of the di-case. The old explanation that it was found wherever dirt and social misery pre vailed is inadequate. There must be places where it is endemic and whence it is

transplanted. Former outbreaks have been traced to Mesopotamia, where it has never entirely disappeared. But in China the plague is endemic, and its centre is the province of Hanan. In Thibet is a second centre. The latest outbreaks in China and India have had their origin there. The third centre is on the west coast of Arabia in the vicinity of Mecca. This centre is of special impertance in view of the pilgrime, but it is doubtful whether the plague is endemic

in the neighborhood of Mecca. Nothing was known of any other plague centre until Prof. Koch discovered a fourth in equatorial Africa. It was found that a devastating disease prevailed in Kissiba. Suspecting that it was the plague, Prof. Koch proceeded from India to West Africa and was able to identify the disease as bu-

bonic plague. In the cases of five persons who died, anatomical preparations were bacteriologically examined, and all the features of the plague were found to be present. Nine out of ten of those infected died. The disease was communicated to rate and monkeys. It is found that an outbreak of the plague among rate frequently precedes a human epidemic, and ras plague may alwave be regarded as a warning.


