THEY FOUGHT NAKED.

How McCall's Marines Rushed Out of the Sea and Into Battle.

Clothed chiefly in cartridge belts McCall's gallant marines charged the Spanish at Guantanamo landing. Not since the time, as veraciously described by Rudyard Kipling, when Private Mulroney and the three year men swam the Irawadi and "tuk Lungtungpen naked" has there been such a combat.

It was shortly after the marines had been fired at that the Spaniards had been reported that the Spaniards had over 8,000 men in and about Guantanamo, the Americas hardly feared an attack. Still guards were posted in two lines outside the camp and a sharp watch kept.

That night the Marblehead swept the hillsides with its searchlight, but no trace of a foe was discovered. The men got to laughing at each other for seeing spoils, and the impression grew that the sounds in the brush were made by animals. So things passed until Saturday afternoon.

Up from the sea came running a line of naked men, grabbing their carbines and falling into place as Colonel Huntington issued his orders, getting a formation in semicircle behind the brow of the hill and waiting to see how much force would develop against him.

A few Spaniards had been seen near the head of the lagoon when the first shots were fired, but the scattering rifle cracks did not indicate any concentrated body of men. Huntington moved his line up, ordered the men to kneel and then gave the command to fire.

The American guns talked as if the men were at practice drill on some home parade ground. There was no ragged firing with out orders, and the naked men were as ready as the rest.

But there was no definite mark to shoot at. After the first showing at long range not a Spaniard was seen, and the men banged away at waving bushes or where sounds seemed to indicate a moving body. Apparently the Spaniards made a theatrical sort of showing and ran just as soon as Sergeant Smith's guards began to fire.

Half an hour afterward Colonel Huntington reformed his men on the crest of the hill, having beaten up the bush for a mile around. Roll call showed every man present, and not a wound was reported. Then the men put on their uniforms.

TRYING TO TAKE HIS LIFE.

DETROIT, Mich., July 14.—George Lish, aged sixty, whose home is in Durham, Oxford county, Ontario, cut his throat with a jack knife at the railroad crossing and Woodward avenue last night. He cut himself twice just below the left ear and bled profusely from his wounds. He is now at the Harper hospital where, this morning he was reported as resting comfortably.

TO BECOME A BRITISH COLONY.

ST. THOMAS, D.W.I., July 14.—In the house of assembly of Dominica, in the Leeward group of the British West Indies, a resolution was introduced in favor of accepting the offer of Joseph Chamberlain, imperial secretary of state for the colonies, on condition of a change in the local constitution by which the island should become a crown colony.

THE TERMS TO BE ARRANGED

FOR THE SURRENDER OF THE CITY OF SANTIAGO.

But General Shafter Declined To Treat—He Wanted An Unconditional Surrender And At Once—Ordered To Retire To The Death. WASHINGTON, July 14.—A cablegram from Gen. Shafter announces that the Spaniards have appointed commissioners to arrange terms of surrender. The Spanish proposition has been declined. Gen. Shafter has been notified that nothing short of an unconditional surrender, and that immediately, is to be considered.

MADRID, July 14.—It is officially announced that captain general Blanco has been instructed to order the Spanish commander at Santiago to resist to the death. New York, July 14.—A despatch to the World from Gibraltar, Spain, says: A steamer just arrived from the Mediterranean reports having sighted admiral Camara's squadron steering in the direction of Carthagena.

Gun practice was constantly carried on aboard the warships as long as they were in sight. Owing to the report that commodore Watson's fleet is coming to Spain the inhabitants of Ceuta and Algeciras are leaving for inland towns. New York, July 14.—A despatch to the World from Madrid says that Germany has given Spain a 200-mile guarantee that she will take the lead among the European powers in exercising pressure to maintain Spanish rule in the Philippines and in restricting America to a coaling station on Ponape island in the Caroline group.

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., July 14.—The United States auxiliary cruiser St. Louis sailed for Annapolis at six o'clock this morning, having on board admiral Covens and the other Spanish officials captured at Santiago on July 3rd. MADRID, July 14.—An official despatch from Manila dated July 9th, says the garrison of that place and the Spanish outposts have conflicts daily with the insurgents who are receiving numerous reinforcements.

MADRID, July 14.—A despatch from governor-general Aguinaldo, dated from Manila, says the insurgents are divided into two parties, one advocating independence, the other autonomy. He adds that a majority of the inhabitants of the Philippines are opposed to the American occupation of the islands and he expressed the belief that by the concession of reform the confidence of the natives can still be gained. MADRID, July 14.—An official despatch from Havana says the steamer San Domingo has arrived at Varo Pato, Mexico with provisions and letters, saying that Pinar del Rio has been bombarded and set on fire by an American warship.

MONEY NOT PUT UP.

The Whole Thing May Fall Through—A Baseball Season. OTTAWA, Ont., July 14.—Capt. McLean, late A.D.C. to Major Gen. Cadogan, has received a commission in the Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry, Toronto. The association for buying the Rochester baseball franchise may yet fall through, as the necessary capital has not yet been raised. Unless it is forthcoming this afternoon the whole affair will be declared off. Mayor Bingham is interesting himself in the matter.

Mr. and Mrs. McLean, adjutant and captain of the Salvation army in this city, left this afternoon for Exeter, where they will be in charge of the army force there. They were tendered a farewell in the barracks last evening. A Boy Had A Fall. TORONTO, July 14.—The police commissioners will petition the minister of justice to make the searching of prisoners legal and thus prevent robbery in the cells.

George Toal, twelve years old, was flying a kite on the flat roof of a row of cottages in the rear of his father's residence, Yorkville, when the roof, when he fell to the ground, a distance of thirty-five feet. He received such serious injuries by the fall that his recovery is doubtful. At the city council meeting to-day the proposal to build a travelling platform to carry passengers to the island was endorsed, alderman Lamb's proposal to enlarge the platform to a six sufficient for carriages being carried, and the city engineer was instructed to report on the scheme.

FIRE AT MARGO.
