
There Is One Near the Great Army Camp at Chickamauga.

WILD AND RAPID AND WICKED.

At Lytle's the Volunteer Soldier Finds Pie and Ginger Pop, Fun and Fakirs-A Crude Theater and a Daring Spanish Dancer Among the Attractions.

The volunteer soldier is terribly in earnest when he gets to the front and is engaged in killing and being killed. He was mighty serious, too, when he bid the folks goodby and started from home. But during the interim that he spends in the big army camps he can hardly be serious and earnest all the time. His stays there are too long. He longs for diversion. He wants to do something to kill time, no matter how foolish.

Hence it was that the Midway came into existence at Chickamauga. Imagine, if you please, a little railway station. It is in the sunny south. It is

New England Aug. 11th, 5 p.m other words, this little station is nine miles from a city of 50,000 people that is as far removed from any other city as Boston is from New York. That comparison may convey some impression of its

Steerage to Liverpool Londonderry, London, Glasgow, Queenstown, Belfast, \$22.50 to \$25.50. A month ago this little station was but a squat telegraph office, weather beaten and solitary, by the track. Within a radius of a hundred yards were three other buildings-two dwellings and a rondside 'store." A good bit farther along the road was a smithy. That was all there was 30 days ago of architecture or impabitants at Lytle's. Daily Service on the Picturesque Bay of Quinte.

But the frown of Mars has been to Lytle's the smile of prosperity and the symbol of multiplication. The deserted, dusty road that curved across the solitary railway track, past the lonely semaphore, to reach the front porches of the rural postoffice and grocery, is today like the main street of a boom mining town at the edge of an auriferous reef. The gold bearing strata are the pockets of the 50,000 volunteers camped within riding distance of this mushroom town. It is a deposit that needs no delving, no washing, no stamping, no refining. It mines itself, transports itself and joyously deposits itself in

the gaping receiving vaults of Lytle's. For further information regarding passage and freight apply to H. H. GILDERSLEEVE In short, Lytle's is a Klondike. Its placers need not to be hunted. They are not frozen gravel, dug with much travail from fire loosened beds of icy streams. They need no seeking. They offer flinty and brittle resistance to no pickax. They need neither labor nor coaxing. They are what is called in American slang "a good thing," and they just "push themselves along" with unrestrained eagerness.

For, be it understood, the American volunter, not limited, as is the regular soldier, to a salary of \$13 a month, has his purse weighted with the spoils of a devoted home. He bears with him the loot of willing hands about his hearth and he forgets not the injunctions that follow him to heed his health and coddle his comfort. Could there be a better, richer, more

profitable market for Cheap John? Could there be created a more thirsty desert to be irrigated with apollinaris and pop? A look down the vista of the main street of the new Lytle's carries one to vislons of a rough hown city born in a night There is at best but a narrow space between the railway track and the edge of the National park, where the camps are pitched. That national reservation is sacred ground. It can be invaded by no mercantile enterprise. So to this strip, as narrow as a guich in Colorado, the hunt-

ers for the soldiers' gold are confined. The country road has become a crowded highway, as packed with vehicles as is lower Broadway or the Strand or the Boulevard des Italiens. A hundred cries of contending riders rend the air. Each side of the jammed way is lined with booths, hastily tacked together, of unpainted pine, raw, glaring, offensive to the eye, but in harmony with all the discordent scene. Each shed is provided with a projecting shelf, where is displayed everything imaginable to cat and drink and every conceivable article of gear from

shoestrings to pyjamas. Near this street of vocal noise and money making activity there has been creeted a theater. This home of Thespia is built of rough boards. The seats are benches. There are two rude boxes. The proscenium arch is a rafter. Shakespeare could never have performed when he first fled from Stratford to London before a ruder audience mid ruder surroundings.

The play is only a hodgepodge of lew variety, though it is relieved and given a dash of Parisian chie by one graceful, coquettish, artistic dancer, who has the temerity to assume the Spanish sobriquet of Pepita. Her dancing, while graceful, is as daring as her name, and the soldier audience howls uproarious approval.

Meantime between the theater and the Midway trains loaded with arriving regiments snort and toot and back and cranch along the track. The new troops, hag gard and weary, disembark, answer roll call and are marched away across the fields to their places of bivounc and tent pegging. Lytle's is at once an entrance and the backdoor to the vast Chickamanga camp. It is a Coney Island militant, a martial Over-the-Rhine. It is wild and rapid and noisy. It is not altogether good for the volunteer soldier, but it will probably do hhn no great harm.
