

John Lock Moses, Joseph Moses, Lewis Moses, Antonia Moses. They are accused of having murdered five section men from Heron bay when they were on a fishing excursion

five years ago.
When Joseph Moses was searched the silver watch of one of the missing men was found in his possession. A year later the Indians slew two of their relatives to secure some furs and the next winter murdered a white trader. They have defied capture for years. They lived in the woods like savages, while each was armed with Winchester ritles. The whole party are now in jail here.
