

TERRORS OF SPAIN'S CAPITAL.

How Mobs Are Dispersed and Bread Rioters Cleared From the Plazas-The Civil Guards Do the Work-Who and What They Are.

MADRID IN WARTIME

A STARVING POPULACE ADDS TO THE

Spain's troubles are not all on the seas and on the field of battle. She has troubles at home, and they are not confined to political disturbances. The Spanish people who are neither soldiers, sailors nor policians are causing them. They are disloyal enough in the midst of so many costly and fatal Spanish victories to wish

Of course it is most thoughtless and selfish as well as unpatriotic to insist upon thrusting forward trivialities of this nature at such a time, but they are doing it. The result is that Madrid and some of the other cities are in a most unquiet state.

The conditions which have made it somewhat difficult and often impossible for the poorer classes of Spaniards to coninue the custom of taking three meals a day, or even one, are due either directly or indirectly to the war with the "Yankeo pigs." In the Spanish home ports lie the Spanish merchant vessels, not daring to venture out because of Watson's savage fleet. Therefore Spanish commerce is at a standstill. This means that Spanish factories and Spanish industries of almost every sort have been paralyzed. Little food is being brought into the country, and but little exporting is being done; hence thousands are idle.

Added to this is the fact that it is the poorer classes who bear the bulk of the war tax burden. The most oppressive of these war taxes are the octrol taxes, which are levied on products taken from the country districts into the cities, and vice versa. Thus the peasant who carries eggs, chickens and fruit into Madrid pays an octroi tax on each article at the city gates as he goes in, and if he buys anything in the city he is again taxed as he goes out. Naturally the prices which the peasant demands for his produce are highor than when he had no tax to pay. In the case of the very poor, who always had pounds needs exercise equivalent to raising Aug. 4th a Lard time to get enough to cat, these | 800 tons one foot per day or walking nine prices are now practically prohibitive, and thousands in Madrid have been for weeks without the barest necessities of life.

Realizing that starving people are apt to be desperate the municipal government of Madrid has made efforts to keep the populace quiet by distributing food, and so the open plazas bave been made the theaters of such scenes as are seldom witnessed in a European capital. Motley crowds of gaunt, hollow eyed Spaniards, old and young, throng the streets leading to the plazas and fight their way to the distributing booths, where diminutive rells of bread, little percels of pork, occasional potatoes and broad Spanish beans are doled out to the famished crowds. Under the gest yet chronicled, some sections of the broiling sun they stand for hours at a time waiting for their turn to come.

When the rush for the tables threatens to overwhelm the officials in charge, there is a call for the civil guards, and the troopers charge into the mob, cutting it up into sections and driving the people out of the

The civil guard is the finest and best equipped force forming part of the Spanish army. In a correct sense the guards are not soldiers, but are more of the natumn. ture of police. They are organized on a military plan. The organization consists of some 40,000 men, and in rural sections their special duty consists of protecting and guarding the country roads, even in the most wild and rugged provinces, so that a person can traverso Spain always under the vigilance of a civil guard. Another branch of this fine force does

ordinary police work in the cities and


