WANTS A FOOTHOLD.

Russia Desires a Station in the Malay Peninsula.

LONDON, Aug. 10. - A deepatch to the Standard from Brussets says that in pursuance of her endeavors to secure coaling stations between the Mediterranean and ladivostock, Russia particularly wishes to get a foothold in the Malay peninsula. She hopes through her friendship with the king of Siam to obtain such a footing in the Siamese province north of Penang. The deepatch adds that it is probable that the scheme will succeed, "unless the British representative at Bangkok is very vig-

A Pekin syndicate which represents leading British commercial interests in China, received a cablegram to-day from its chief agent in Pekin saying that the digging of the Nicaragua canal is regarded as a necessity by all Anglo-Saxons in China for the preservation and protection of their interests. It is stated by the syndicate officials bere that the mere announcement by the United States government of ite intention to dig the canal would have a great effect in checking the Russian advance and give Englishmen and Americans control of the trade.


